

## SCOUTING ACHIEVEMENT



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
# EUROPEAN DAY OF LANGUAGES

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# BLACK HISTORY MONTH

The library kicked off October with a celebration of Black History Month, showcasing a wide range of high quality non-fiction titles focusing on Black history, nationally and around the world. They also featured some excellent works of fiction by celebrated Black authors, including Sharna Jackson (very popular with our KS3 students) and Dean Atta (targeted at KS4 readers).

The History department continued to raise awareness with the honour of delivering the Black History Month 2025 assemblies. Mrs Loxton reports: "The theme this year is standing strong in power and pride. We looked at 3 key characteristics of people who are role models to us all. Baroness Doreen Lawrence demonstrates resilience in the face of anger, Johnson Beharry demonstrates strength in the face of unbelievable fear

and Olive Morris demonstrated in her short life the courage to never give up even in the face of discrimination. We wanted to demonstrate the underlying vision that Black history is not separate from British history so the assembly also showed influential black British people from over history and the modern day whose work has made our lives richer and fuller. Our final inspiration was the Forbes magazine 2025 most influential black

person in the UK - Dean Forbes. His story from homeless teenager to CEO of a tech company shows us how resilience, strength and the courage to carry on can still take you to great places. The history department laid down a challenge to all year groups to use these people as role models and make the world a better place."

Assemblies are an important part of our school week, with each year group coming together for one morning each week. We have a varied rota across each term which includes topics covered by Heads of Year, Senior Leaders, guest speakers and special House assemblies. This term we encouraged students to get involved in the myriad opportunities on offer at Bradon, as well as discussing Dyslexia Awareness Week and Black History Month.




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## OWEN'S WORLD

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


## BOOKOPOLY

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

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

building on this success in the cup matches starting next week. Well done to the Year 8 boys' rugby team!"






## CHEERLEADING
